## MUSICIAN, LITURGIST, MINISTER, MENTOR, FRIEND – MARY LOU GROSSMANN TO RETIRE

After 27 years of service as Director of Liturgy and Liturgical Music at St. Hilary Parish, Mary Lou Grossmann has announced her retirement at the end of this month. Mary Lou shares a few thoughts on her years here at St. Hilary:

### Mary Lou

“When I came to St. Hilary’s in 1984, everything was smaller—the school, the church, the choir! What hasn’t changed is the spirit of the community. St. Hilary parishioners are welcoming, open to change and very generous with their time, talent and treasure.

“Serving with three different pastors for whom the worship life of the parish has been of primary importance has been a major blessing to me. Fr. Tom Koegel, Fr. Gordon Yahner and now Fr. Steve have made liturgy and music a priority. And that has made all the difference in my life. I also have been amazed at those who have been willing to share their gifts—from musicians, singers, dancers and artists, to liturgical ministers of all kinds—as well as members of the worshipping community, who are willing to sing God’s praises each weekend.

“Planning weddings with young couples and offering comfort and support to those who have lost loved ones are just a few of the ministry duties I will miss. I will also miss the parish staff, with whom I have prayed and worked, rejoiced and grieved during these many years.

“As I approach retirement, I look forward to having more time to visit family and friends in my hometown of Toledo and to spending a chunk of summer in Colorado with my husband, John. Mostly, I’m going to keep my ears open

to hear where the Spirit might be leading me in doing the Church’s work of charity and justice in our local community.

“When my family moved to Akron thirteen years ago and joined St. Hilary Parish, the first thing I did was call Mary Lou to join the 11:00 Choir. Who would have guessed that that phone call would be the start of a wonderful friendship? Mary Lou’s love of liturgy has certainly rubbed off on me, and her commitment to our parish’s liturgical life is extraordinary. I don’t think most people realize the number of hats Mary Lou wears. She does so much more than plan our liturgies and direct our choir. If there’s a funeral, Mary Lou’s pastoral experience comes into play as she meets with the grieving family, plans the funeral and plays for it. The same is true for weddings, evening prayer and communal penance services. Did I mention she helps decorate our worship space, chairs the Liturgy Commission, finds time for Journey Together for Justice ministry and the *JustFaith* program, directs the Handbell Choir, works with cantors and musicians, buys music, sets up all those microphones and bells, makes sure the weekly School Mass runs without a hitch and, well, Mary Lou pretty much runs all things liturgical around here! And we have been so fortunate. So blessed. I will miss my friend and confidante, for that has been what she is to me. I wish her all the best. She deserves it!”

### Pat Schnee, Pastoral Minister

“Mary Lou and I met while we were both parishioners at St. Sebastian Parish—very active parishioners, especially in the RCIA. So our relationship goes back to about the early ‘80s. When I came to St. Hilary Parish, Mary Lou was already on the staff here and served as a real mentor. She had been hired by Fr. Tom Koegel about eight years earlier.

“From Mary Lou I learned to use the word ‘challenge’ instead of ‘problem’— or something even less lady-like! What a blessing it has been, especially in the RCIA, to work with someone who has both musical and liturgical expertise. In spite of the hours she puts in at the Parish (and she is here seven days a week), I have never heard her complain. ‘That’s what the work requires,’ she would say, and she loves the work. I think that shows. We have laughed together, cried together, and worked side by side for twenty years. There are no words to adequately express the huge part of my life she has been.”

“It goes without saying that Mary Lou is very talented and knowledgeable about liturgy and liturgical music. Very few people have the background and training that she does. Her understanding of church, liturgy, and people, her attention to detail and her willingness to work long hours help make the liturgies as prayerful and meaningful as they are. She is willing to spend the time to work with cantors and instrumentalists, to teach the liturgy committee about the principles of liturgy, to get the wording just right for the prayers of the faithful, and to listen to a grieving family talk about their loved one. This is not just a job to her; it is a calling, a ministry, and a love. For the past several years, I have had a routine of going to St. Hilary’s on Thursday mornings to practice the organ for Sunday, and I always stop in Mary Lou’s office to talk about the music coming up. Over the years we ended up sharing much more than music. We talked about what was going on in the Church, the world, and each other’s lives and our children’s lives. Mary Lou has been a real friend to me; she is a great listener who really cares about others’ concerns. I am going to miss those Thursday visits. It has been such a joy for me to get to work with Mary Lou, to learn from her, and to be friends. She will be missed.

### LuAnne Toth, St. Hilary School music teacher and parish Music Minister

“Mary Lou has worked with me since I was 19 years old and was just becoming an accompanist. She took me under her wing and over the years has taught me so much about the Church’s rites, rituals and liturgies. She has also mentored me as Director of the Contemporary Choir at the 9:00 Mass and leader of music at the 7:30 Mass.. Almost everything I have done musically has had Mary Lou as a major influence. She even plans the school liturgies, including the readings. She has taught everyone involved in music at the Parish and the School that liturgy is not a performance—that the choirs, for example, should enhance the liturgy by leading and enhancing, not performing. She has helped me more than anybody knows. Mary Lou is a fabulous musician, an amazing woman, and I will miss her terribly!”

# Family Spirituality

## Celebrating the Father, Son and Holy Spirit

During this month of June, families can celebrate at home three important events on the Church Calendar.

June 12th

### The great feast of Pentecost

Pentecost is considered the birthday of the Church, when the risen Lord gave the apostles the great gift of the Holy Spirit, who poured God's love into their hearts and so into our hearts.

Celebrate Pentecost with your family by wearing the color red to church. Red is the color of fire and symbolizes the presence of God. Here's why: After the resurrection, when Jesus appeared to his disciples, He poured the power of the Holy Spirit into them. A great wind filled the entire house, and tongues of fire appeared above them. Each began to speak in different languages. Jesus sends the Holy Spirit to each of us in the sacraments and through prayer.

Make a red birthday cake for the Church's birthday celebration, with a candle for each member of your family, to represent the family of the Church. As you pray at dinner and before bed, ask God to fill you with the Holy Spirit, which means to be filled with a powerful love of God and with the power to do His work on earth.

#### Prayer to the Holy Spirit

Come Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in them the fire of your love.

Send forth your spirit, and they shall be created, and you will renew the face of the earth.

O God, on the first Pentecost you instructed the hearts of those who believed in you by the light of the Holy Spirit.

Under the inspiration of the same Spirit, give us a taste for what is right and true and a continuing sense of the Spirit's joy-bringing presence and power, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

June 19th

### Father's Day and Feast of the Holy Trinity

Celebrate your earthly father, your dad, by showing him your love in special ways. But also remember your heavenly Father on this day. How about a Father's Day Card for God the Father, too, to celebrate the great mystery of the Trinity: Father, Son and Holy Spirit—three persons in one God.

Remember that our parish's patron saint, Saint Hilary, became famous for defending the doctrine of the Trinity, and wrote the first major book about it, called *De Trinitas*.

On this day, families may want to pray the Apostles Creed during their prayer time together, just as we do at Sunday Mass. Talk about what the Creed says and what it means. Wish God a "Happy Father's Day" before tucking into bed at night.

June 26th

### Feast of the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ

This is a day to be especially aware of God's love for us as we share it in the gift of the Eucharist at Mass. This would be a good day to talk about the day of your own First Communion - to get out the pictures, videos, artwork, and other memorabilia from your own First Communion day. Mealttime prayer can consist of a special prayer of thanksgiving for the Holy Eucharist (see below), and perhaps the sharing of homemade bread from a favorite recipe to remind us that sharing the bread of life together is what the Eucharist is all about. Pretend you're at the Last Supper!
